

Boat classes included Optimist, Laser, Blue Jay, JY 15, Club 420 and Etchells. In conjunction with awards for the various classes, JY15s also competed for the State Championship. The regatta chair, Claire "Vicky" Wiseman, did an outstanding job rallying the competitors and organizing the events. "The level of competition was outstanding

and we hope to have many more sailors join us next year!" said Vicky.

The two-day event began with a 'kick off' reception hosted by Lenox Jewelers of Fairfield.
